**The Gospel** Mark 8:27-38

The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Mark.

**Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

Jesus went on with his disciples to the villages of Caesarea Philippi; and on the way he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that I am?" And they answered him, "John the Baptist; and others, Elijah; and still others, one of the prophets." He asked them, "But who do you say that I am?" Peter answered him, "You are the Messiah." And he sternly ordered them not to tell anyone about him.

Then he began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. ## The Great Thanksgiving

God be with you.



## Communion

We do not allow dipping the bread into the wine. ■ Respond to communion by saying "Amen." ■ If you prefer a blessing, cross your hands over your chest. ■ Gluten-free wafers are available at each communion station. ■ Baptism is offered several times a year; speak to a priest to learn more.*

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**Liturgical Note**—The Season of Creation ([seasonofcreation.org](http://seasonofcreation.org)) is an ecumenical celebration that invites us to listen to and care for “this fragile earth, our island home,” as we hear in Eucharistic Prayer C. In this season, stretching from the Feast of Creation on September 1 through the Feast of St. Francis on October 4, Christians around the world join in prayer and action, renewing a commitment to care for the gift of God's creation. Our creed is from Tírechán, a 7th-century Irish bishop best known for his biography of St. Patrick. The Prayers of the People are inspired by the language St. Francis often used in describing creation.

**Land Acknowledgement**—We meet today on the traditional land of the first people of Nacotchtank, who were custodians of the land for thousands of years, caring for and nurturing it. We give thanks for their stewardship and lament the ways the Nacotchtank were removed from their ancestral home. We pray for all who live on this land and pay our respects to the native leaders past, present, and emerging.

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
